History in the making as Karina performs the Lymm Morris Dance

HISTORY was in the making when 'local lass' Karina Middlehurst performed with Lymm Morris at the recent Rushbearing Festival in the village.

It was the first time a woman had danced the Lymm Dance with the traditonally all'male morris side where she was joined by another lady, Ann Bolshaw on accordian. As a 'local lass' for 18 years now, and a Morris dancer with two

other sides (including another local mixed 'border' side, Bollin Morris) she had for some years wanted to dance the local Lymm Dance. Unfortunately, it was danced by an all male side. all-male side.

However, recently, traditional all-male Morris many sides have been voting at their AGMs and changing to become mixed sides. While Lymm Morris and Thelwall Morris are officially different sides, Thelwall Morris did this last year.

Karina said: "For the past couple of years Lymm Morris has been appealing for new dancers and musicians to keep the tradition alive, so now seemed the right time to ask. There was no hesitation, and

I was welcomed to the practice the week before Rushbearing to learn the dance! I was not the only lady at the practice, so Rushbéaring was also Ann's first performance as a musician for Lymm. Ann also dances for the local mixed 'Cotswold' side Earl of Stamford Morris.

"I was a bit nervous, not having had much practice before the dance out, but all went well. I may occasionally have been on the wrong foot, but mostly in the right place, so hopefully the audience never noticed! It's a shame it is only danced three times a year. I can't wait until Dickensian to dance it out again. All Morris dancing is great fun – and great exercise too – 1 recommend anyone to give it a try! The Lymm Dance has been heavily researched and was revived

by Thelwall Morris in 1980.



Permits plan to tackle anti-social behaviour caused by parking

AN experimental parking permits-only scheme has been introduced on two roads at Lymm to tackle anti-social behaviour caused by long-stay commuter and car-sharing activities.

A long-standing issue has existed at Old Cherry Lane and Cherry Corner, Lymm for many years resulting in the anti-social behaviour and instances relating to criminality and a mixture of long-stay commuter/ car-sharing activities.


This has resulted in accessibility issues for residents and a local business.

The Order became effective from 5th September 2024 and will remain in force for a period not exceeding 18 months.

Warrington Borough Council will be considering in due course, within the Experimental Order period, whether the provisions of the Experimental Order should continue in force indefinitely.

Please note that all representations received may be considered in public by the Council and that the substance of any representation together with the name and address of the person making it could become available for public inspection.

Work underway on Lymm Poppy Appeal

WORK is well underway on organising the annual Lymm Poppy Appeal, with last year's activities helping raise over £22,000.

As well as Poppy Appeal Boxes around the village the big red poppies will soon start appearing on lamp posts around the village. One of the organisers Linda Monks

said: "The time is fast approaching when the boxes of poppies will be back in our shops, hotels, bars, restaurants, churches, schools and supermarkets. Our big red poppies will be back on the large parts to will be back on the lamp posts, too.

"Remembrance time is a very special time of year. It's a time when we unite across faiths, cultures and background to remember those who have served and are serving their country in the armed forces and those who sadly never returned home to their families and friends. We pray for a peaceful world, but there are still so many conflicts raging around

the world. "In 2024, we're asking you once again to wear your Poppy with pride. The Poppy remains the symbol of Remembrance.All those years ago

in Flanders field the red poppies grew, a reminder of the horrors that had gone before but also a symbol of Remembrance, Respect and Hope for the future.

"People always ask where the money raised by the Poppy Appeal goes to. Last year in Lymm and High Legh you, our community, raised just over £22,000 which was amazing. That generosity was replicated throughout the country and enabled the Royal British Legion to do so very much for wounded service personnel,

veterans and their families." Linda added: "Last year the RBL's welfare teams supported 40,000 cases in a variety of ways. 25% of grants went towards providing essentials such as food and clothing to ensure our Armed Forces community never had to go hungry or cold. The Admiral Nurses assisted over 1,200 new families living with dementia. 12% of grants went into improving independence through mobility equipment and adaptations which helped to support disabled veterans and family members to live their lives to the fullest. The RBL Care Homes provided support for more than 800 people last year either as

than 800 people last year enter as residents or attending for day care. "In addition, the RBL supported the work of several rehabilitation centres as well as The Battle Back Centre where £3000 could provide a veteran with the support they need to regain their independence via a multi-activity recovery course. Those funds raised by the Poppy Appeal also enabled our brave men and women to train and take part in the

Invictus Games. The range of support that the Poppy Appeal finances is great and far reaching, but it costs. Last year the number of cases supported by the welfare team saw an increase of 43%.

So, please, when you see our Poppy Boxes around the community and our wonderful volunteers in the two Sainsbury's and up at the Truck Stop, do give generously. Wildflowers are blooming in Lymm

FOR the third year running, wildflowers are blooming in Lymm thanks to an initiative by Lymm Parish Council.

And this year the council has expanded the scheme from Ridgway Grundy Park to other parts of the village including Rushgreen Road and Higher Lane, winning widespread praise from local residents. The flowers provide a blaze of colour for villagers to admire and a haven for bees and numerous other insects.

As previously, the flowers have been planted by Warrington Borough Council,

but the idea came from the parish council who also footed the bill. This year the display in the park runs the full length of the football pitch. But this year it has been moved further from the playing area to leave more space for spectators – mainly parents watching local youngsters playing against visiting teams.

But, perhaps surprisingly, the display suffered very little damage from footballers or spectators in previous years so perhaps in future years it may prove possible to plant on both sides of the path which runs through the park, creating a colourful avenue for residents to walk through. The additional planted areas in other parts of the village have been welcomed by people who do not use the park.



Your pet questions answered

How can I keep my pet safe during Halloween festivities?

Halloween can be a fun time for the whole family, but it can also present certain risks for pets. To keep your pet safe, consider these tips.

Chocolate and other sweets can be toxic to pets. Make sure all Halloween treats are stored securely and well out of reach of curious noses. If you suspect your pet has ingested something harmful, contact us immediately.

If you plan to dress your pet in a costume, ensure it fits well and doesn't restrict movement, breathing or vision. Some pets may find costumes stressful, so if your pet seems uncomfortable, it's best to skip the costume altogether.

With the doorbell ringing and strangers in costumes, Halloween can be overwhelming for pets. Create a safe, quiet space for your pet to retreat to if they become anxious. If your pet suffers severely with anxiety, please contact us to discuss how we can help manage this.

What should I consider when walking my dog in the dark?

As the days get shorter in October, many pet owners find themselves walking their dogs in the dark

Equip your dog with a reflective collar, lead or harness. You can also use LED collars or attach small lights to your dog's gear to make them more visible to motorists and other pedestrians.

Stick to familiar routes that are well lit to avoid any hazards that may be difficult to see in the dark, such as uneven pavements or debris.

October is a time when many wild animals, like deer, are more active, animals, like aeer, are more acrive, especially at dawn and dusk. Keep your dog on a lead to prevent them from chasing wildlife and getting lost or injured.



How can I help my pet transition as temperatures drop?

As the weather cools, it's important help your pet adjust to the changing temperatures.

Make sure your pet has a warm, comfortable place to sleep, especially if they usually sleep on the floor. Consider adding extra blankets or investing in a pet bed that retains heat.

If your pet's bed is near a door or window, check for draughts and consider moving their bed to a warmer, more insulated area of the house.

If you have outdoor pets like rabbits or guinea pigs, ensure their housing is well-insulated and protected from the wind and rain. Consider bringing them inside on particularly cold nights.

Are there any specific health concerns for pets in October? October brings some specific health concerns that pet owners should be aware of:

Just like humans, pets can suffer from seasonal allergies. If you notice your pet scratching more than usual or experiencing watery eyes or a runny nose, it might be due to autumn allergens like mould or pollen.

allergens like mould or pollen. Cooler weather can exacerbate joint pain, particularly in older pets or those with arthritis. If your pet seems stiff or has difficulty moving, speak to us about possible supplements or medications to ease their discomfort. While ticks are often associated

While ticks are often associated with the summer months, they can remain active well into autumn. Continue using tick prevention products and check your pet regularly, especially after walks in wooded or grassy areas.

"Prison block" retirement homes plan rejected against officer advice



CONTROVERSIAL plans for "prison block" retirement homes on a former Green Belt site at Lymm have been rejected against officer advice.

Members of Warrington Borough Council's Development Control committee voted to reject the application by McCarthy and Stone for the retirement homes development on land at Watercress Farm.

The scheme was the third the company have put forward for land at Watercress Farm, off Thirlmere Drive, Lymm. It proposed 36 one and two bedroom apartments in a part-three, part-two storey building. Previous proposals were for 45

retirement apartments and were opposed by nearly 60 residents and by Lymm Parish Council.

Amended proposals were for 42 homes and the latest scheme was

for 36. Parking for 26 cars was proposed, along with a terrace to provide an outdoor sitting area and interior communal facilities.

Local Cllr Chris East spoke out against the application saying the building was too large and overbearing and out of keeping with the environment, made worse

by the land levels. The flat roof and large expanses of blank wall were not acceptable and it looked more like a prison block!

Views from the Bridgewater Canal would also be spoilt and design did not fit well with the historic cottages in Fletchers Lane. Concerns were also raised about

flooding and land drainage issues. There was also too much dependency on the car for access to the site.

While there was no option but to accept that something will be built on this site the Parish Council and residents were not happy with the current proposal and urged members of the committee to turn it down and send it back for further consideration.

Planning officers pointed out that the scheme is part of a larger development of 136 homes and a health centre which already have planning consent and the site is no longer in the Green Belt.







Understanding Spousal Maintenance

Spousal maintenance is a form of financial provision made by one spouse or former spouse to the other as part of divorce. It is separate from and therefore can be in addition to child maintenance / support. It is typically paid every month and may be payable for a set length of time or for 'joint lives', ie, until one party dies.

Most divorcing couples prefer to have a clean break and so without any future financial commitments to the other, and the court is obliged to consider a clean break in every case, but sometimes the particular circumstances of a case are such that either a clean break is not suitable or just not achievable.

There are a number of reported cases which have shaped the support there is no fixed formula to follow. Instead, the court has a wide discretion and will consider a number of factors such as income and earning capacity, financial needs and obligations, standard of living, age's and length of marriage. As part of the assessment both parties must prepare present and future budgets setting out their reasonable monthly income needs.

Spousal maintenance can be ordered in various forms, including: (1) as an interim payment payable pending a final financial order being made; (2) on a term basis and so for a set period until a specified date or event; (3) on a joint lives basis and so until one party dies. But if the recipient remarries then the maintenance will automatically end and there are many other changes in circumstances which could give rise to the need to review and perhaps vary the order - which could be either upwards or downwards.

Spousal maintenance is a complex area of family law and as always there is no proper substitute for taking advice specific to your particular case as every family's circumstances are different.
